The consensus was to wait for the approval but have all the technical work completed so that the transition can be made immediately after approval.

and needs a hearing aid, Rusty is in remarkably good health and has a very sharp mind. He reads a lot of talking books of a technical nature and has a wide range of interests. He still reads QST (in the audio version) and keeps up with the latest technology. It was truly inspiring to converse with someone who has led such an interesting life.

Born July 16, 1923 in Liberal, Kansas, he was a son of Rolla and Ola Crowder. Joe is survived by his wife of 62 years, Betty C. Ferguson Crowder. He served his country in the U.S. Navy during WWII. BUD WAITE, W2ZK REMEMBERED

The news just reported the "rescue" of the 52 tourist "scientists" from the chartered Russian cruise ship MV Akademik Shokalskiy, trapped in the sea ice of Antarctica 22miles from open water since Christmas day. A Chinese helicopter flew the passengers to the Aurora Australis which transported them to Hobart, New Zealand. They

were ice-bound in one of the windiest places on earth (by Guinness Book of Records standards), in Commonwealth Bay, Antarctica.

A GSARA member from years ago made history on the ice of Antarctica. This was Amory "Bud" Waite, W2ZK of Oceanport, N.J.

Waite said, "I got hooked on radio when I met a Navy radio operator and saw him operate his wireless set. This led me to enlist in the Navy for four years in World War I." His knowledge of radio communication brought Waite to Antarctica, to Little America, as chief radio operator on Admiral Byrd's Second Antarctic Expedition, 1933 to 1935.

In 1934, Byrd set out to spend the winter alone at Advance Camp, the southernmost weather station, 123 miles south of Little America on the Ross Ice Shelf. Byrd reported his scientific observations daily by radio to his headquarters station at Little America. After a few months, many back at Little America began to fear that Byrd was suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning from his kerosene heater. After two failed attempts, Dr. Thomas Poulter, Pete Demas and Bud Waite arrived and rescued Byrd.

Waite later participated in 22 other polar expeditions. After World War II, Waite was head of an Arctic and Antarctic research team that did much scientific research that greatly increased knowledge of the polar regions. While investigating the unusual number of plane crashes while landing on ice, he discovered that radio waves penetrated the ice instead of reflecting back to determine the plane's altitude. This led to his method of measuring ice thickness using radio waves rather than seismic recording after buried explosions in the ice.

In 1960, a portion of the Antarctic continent located at 73 degrees south and 103 degrees west was officially named Cape Waite. Before Bud died in January, 1985, a group of islands 100 miles northwest of Cape Waite have been named The Waite Islands.

For all his accomplishments "Bud" Waite is to be remembered as a scientist, an explorer, an inventor, a friend and colleague of Admiral Byrd, and, of course, as a true radioman, W2ZK.

A VISIT WITH RUSTY SCHMID, K2LL

In January, John, KA2F and I had the pleasure of visiting with Rusty Schmid, K2LL at Renaissance Garden in Seabrook Village. Rusty was born on June 27, 1909 in Lamberton, Minnesota, a small town in southwestern Minnesota about 50 miles north of the Iowa border and 50 miles east of the South Dakota border. If you do the math, you will see that he will be 105 years old this coming June. Although he has been blind for a number of years, he is in remarkably good health and looks 20 years younger than he really is.

Rusty was first licensed as W9BKK in 1931 (the upper Midwest was in the 9th district until after WW II) and subsequently obtained the prestigious Extra First Class license (the predecessor to the Extra Class license) in the 1930s. The Morse code came easy for him and shortly after receiving his license, he was copying 40 wpm and writing 35 wpm. He attributes that to a ham neighbor of his who always sent blazing fast. Rusty asked him one day why he always sent so fast to him and the neighbor replied that "if I sent slower, you'd never learn to copy at high speed." During the depression, Rusty became very active in the Army Amateur Radio Service (AARS, the predecessor to MARS). He was eventually the Director of the 7th Corps Area District covering several states with headquarters in Omaha, Nebraska. This CW traffic activity took place just below the 80 meter band around 3495 kHz.

Just before World War II, Rusty had moved to Sioux Falls, South Dakota and was in the radio repair business. He noticed an ad in QST for a high speed radio operator which he thought looked intriguing so he applied. He was offered a lucrative job but it was in Alaska. After consulting with his wife, they decided to turn the offer down. In a subsequent month, there was another ad in QST for a job at Fort Monmouth. Since his wife had a sister living in the East, the New Jersey location looked attractive so he applied for the job. In a few days, a telegram came from Fort Monmouth that said "come right away." Although he knew nothing about the job

or what it would pay, he packed everything in his Nash, including his wife and two kids, and drove east.

After arriving in New Jersey, Rusty got a room in Highlands, put his wife and kids on the train to Boston to visit his wife's sister and reported for work at Fort Hancock (Sandy Hook). He was escorted into a shielded room with a large workbench stocked with various resistors and capacitors. A Lieutenant came into the room carrying a steel box which he plopped on the bench and told Rusty to "fix it" and left the room. Rusty opened the box and deduced that it was some kind of superhet radio receiver with acorn tubes for the VHF front end. He recognized the power supply and saw that the power was distributed to the various tubes along a power bus. Tracing the power to each tube, he found a broken resistor that didn't let power get to one of the tubes. He read the color code of the resistor, found a replacement among the parts on the bench and replaced the damaged resistor. Lieutenant came back into the room and asked how he was doing. Rusty said that it was fixed and this impressed the Lt. Rusty suspects that the resistor was deliberately broken and this served as a test to see how good he was at troubleshooting radio circuits.

He was given a Secret clearance and was issued a badge marked SECRET that was needed to get on Sandy Hook. The first badge also had the word "RADAR" on it but it was quickly recalled when even the word "RADAR" was classified and a new badge issued.

Being blind, Rusty can't read anymore but he does rely heavily on talking books and loves to keep up on the latest technologies. He gets QST as an audio book and listens to it every month. He is a heavy user of the talking book library in Trenton and recently finished "Nuclear Roulette," a book about problems in the nuclear power industry. He has been following the increasing efficiency and lowering cost of solar panels and is intrigued by EHV DC power transmission. He's sorry he won't be around to see the application of much of this new technology.

Rusty has a computer and has written about 50 stories about various aspects of his life. I asked him how he can use a computer and he said that it

is easy with a program that converts text to speech so he doesn't have to read on the monitor.

John and I were both very impressed with Rusty. His mind is sharper than that of many people 30 years younger than he and he is truly interested in all the latest technology. He is intrigued by PSK31 and thinks he could operate this mode with a text to speech converter. He inspires me to continue learning about all the new technology and to try to keep my mind at least half as sharp as his. God Bless Him!

TOWER MISHAP IN IDAHO

Robert "Bearpaw" Galindo, KE7ADT, of Athol, Idaho, was critically injured February 13 when the winching cable of his 40 foot crank-up tower snapped while he was working on the tower. Galindo, 52, a General class licensee and ARRL member, was reported trapped and dangling 20 feet in the air when rescue crews arrived at his home. His wife, Gail Perry, KE7ADN, witnessed the accident and called 911. The mishap resulted in the loss of Galindo's right hand and several fingers of his left hand.

Timberlake Fire Protection District officials reported that rescuers had to raise the upper tower sections to extricate Galindo. He was transported by helicopter to a hospital in Coeur d'Alene, where he underwent surgery. Galindo was listed in critical condition following the surgery and was expected to remain hospitalized for several days.
