BOOK REVIEW

At the GSARA Hamfest, I picked up the book "Today I am a Ham" by Ethelyn M. Parkinson, Abingdon Press, 1968. The award-winning author has written several children's books and lived in northern Wisconsin. She died in 1999. I found this out of print children's book interesting and very easy to read. It tells the story of a young boy and his friends getting on the air with their Novice license and upgrading to General. Although short on technical details (the book is written for ages 10 and up), the story is a good one and anyone who came into the hobby in the 50s through the 70s as a teen with a Novice license will be able to relate to it.

I found it interesting that the dedication of the book was: "With love to Catherine who knows that there's absolutely nothing like having a ham in the house – unless it's having two!" With a little digging, I found that Catherine is the sister-in-law of the author. Catherine had two boys, James Parkinson, W9JEF and Wayne Parkinson, W9JDG who are still licensed and started as Novices in 1954. Their calls were used in the book but the story is pure fiction. Digging through my old QSL cards, I found that I worked Jim, W9JEF on January 10, 1955 on 80 meter CW. It's a small world! I wrote to Jim and enclosed a copy of his QSL card but have not yet heard back.

The book has been donated to the GSARA Library. Although written for children, I think many of the adult members of GSARA would find it an interesting story. It's pure fiction, of course, but a quick read.

HENRY & THE ELECTROMAGNET

Andre Ampere discovered in 1823 that a wire wound in a solenoid would maximize the magnetic field along the center axis due to current flow in the wire (see June 2016 Propagator). Experimenters then attempted to increase the magnetic field by putting an iron rod in the center of the solenoid. Although the magnetic effect was enhanced, it still was relatively weak. The next enhancement was to varnish the iron rod and then wind the solenoid directly on the insulated rod. This strengthened the magnet but not significantly. The problem was that the number of turns on the rod was limited because the bare copper wire used had to have the turns spaced to keep from shorting them out. In the late 1820s, a teacher at the Albany (NY) Institute by the name of Joseph Henry came up with the idea of insulating the wire used in an electromagnet and thus was able to wind the turns close together and in several layers to obtain a rather powerful electromagnet.

Henry found that by bending the bar magnet into a horseshoe shape resulted in even stronger attraction. He then wound several separate coils on the horseshoe-shaped bar and found that if the windings were wired in parallel, the magnetic strength was increased using a single galvanic cell. In fact, the more windings he connected in parallel, the stronger the magnet providing that the plates for the galvanic cell were increased in size. He called such a device a magnitude electromagnet. Similarly, if he wired the windings in series, he could get maximum magnetic attraction by powering with a voltaic pile (what we would call a higher voltage battery). He called such a device an intensity electromagnet.

Joseph Henry's next invention consisted of a bar magnet on a pivot with an electromagnet near one end. When he energized the electromagnet, the bar magnet would be attracted to it so would pivot and the other end of the bar magnet would strike a bell. He found that if the bell were placed a long distance from the voltaic pile, best results were obtained by using an intensity electromagnet for the bell. By this means, he wired his house in 1830 so that by connecting the circuit in one room, he could ring the bell in a different room. This has come to be accepted as the first electric

telegraph. A few years later, to extend the range of his bell "telegraph", Henry invented the relay which is an electromagnet that, upon energizing, would close a contact to put a fresh voltaic pile on the line thus extending the range of his telegraph. Like Ben Franklin, Henry never patented any of his inventions but instead put his ideas in the public domain so that others could improve on his findings.

Henry went on in 1831 to invent a "motor" using a rocking electromagnet powered through a commutator that reversed the electromagnet to cause it to rock back and forth.

Joseph Henry's inventions were soon put to practical use. The powerful electromagnets were used to separate iron particles from ore. Electromagnets played a key role in the development of the telegraph which we'll get to next month. Electric motors and even Bell's telephone all depended on Henry's electromagnet. So now you know.

SMALLER SOLAR CYCLES AHEAD

Propagation guru Carl Luetzelschwab, K9LA, says that, while conditions on 12 and 10 meters will pick up as they always do in the fall, F₂ propagation on those bands will decline thereafter, with only sporadic E during the summer months as a possible saving grace. On the other hand, the lower bands -- 160, 80, and 40 meters -- should be good going forward, and 20 and 17 meters will be the mainstays of daylight HF propagation. Luetzelschwab offered these observations during an August 23 World Wide Radio Operators Foundation ([WWROF](#))-sponsored [webinar](#) "Solar Topics -- Where We're Headed." He said data suggest that Solar Cycle 24, the current solar cycle, will bottom out in 2020, and he advised that radio amateurs may need to lower their expectations on the higher bands (and 6 meters) looking beyond that.

"There seems to be a good correlation between how long a solar minimum is and the next solar cycle," said Luetzelschwab. "The longer you spend at solar minimum, the smaller the next cycle. He observed that hams active since the 1950s and 1960s have experienced short inter-cycle solar minimums of approximately 2 years, until the one between Solar Cycle 23 and Solar Cycle 24, which lasted about 4 years.

On the other hand, he said, it looks like the downward trend of disappearing sunspots has leveled off, suggesting that Solar Cycle 25 may see a lower smoothed sunspot number as opposed to zero or near-zero sunspots.

Luetzelschwab's article "The New Sunspot Numbers," appearing in the October issue of *QST*, discusses the new sunspot numbers.

Luetzelschwab cited historical sunspot cycle data going back centuries -- including the "Maunder Minimum" of zero and near-zero sunspots between the years 1645 and 1715 and a later, less-drastic "Dalton Minimum." He pointed out that over the last 11,000 years, 19 notable grand maximums -- including Solar Cycle 19 and the cycles around it -- and 27 notable grand minimums were recorded. "We're likely to have more of both grand maximums and grand minimums in the future," he predicted. The current system of numbering sunspot cycles begins with Solar Cycle 1 in the mid-18th century.
