The meeting was called to order at Fort Monmouth by President Jeff Harshman, N2LXM, at 8:02 PM. There were 17 members and one guest in attendance. The guest was Sandra Ottenberg, XYL of Dave, WA2DJN. After the Pledge to the Flag, all members present then introduced themselves.

Treasurer Frank Wroblewski, W2XYZ was not present so there was no treasurer's report.

Secretary's Report

Secretary Bob Buus, W2OD reported that no correspondence was received in January. A motion was made by Nena, N2WAY and seconded by Peggy Struening to accept the minutes of the January meeting as published in the February Propagator. The motion passed unanimously.

Old Business

Marty, WN2DX reported on the status of Field Day planning. At this time, it is proposed that we run the K2USA station as 1F the same as last year. It is proposed to run W2GSA at the football stadium with the same antennas as last year. It has been suggested that we run W2GSA at high power so we can make a lot more contacts than the QRP station last year. There will be a planning meeting prior to the March 1 meeting. It is asked that those interested in the planning try to get to the MARS building by 7:00 PM on March 1.

Announcements

Radio classes run by OMARC at the Diana site will resume on Monday, March 27 at 6:30 PM and run every Monday through June 3 with a VE exam session on June 14.

Suitsat is due to be launched on Friday, February 3 and should be heard by just about any 2-meter radio. Listen for its signal on 145.990 plus or minus Doppler.

He responded to the call for volunteers on Friday, September 2 and was told Saturday morning to report to Montgomery, Alabama. His assignments were all far enough away from the severe destruction so that there was electricity at all times. He also had cell phone service at all times. There were a lot of displaced people in the shelters and there was plenty of confusion. Our hat is off to Howard for going out of his way to help out.

The main door prize was won by Sandy Ottenberg, XYL of WA2DJN but she donated it back to the club. There being no further business, a motion was made by Peggy Struening and seconded by Nena, N2WAY to adjourn. The meeting was closed at 9:20 PM.

SUITSAT-1 HAS DIED

SuitSat-1 is now a confirmed "Silent Key." So says its sponsor, the Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) program. In operation for more than two weeks, SuitSat-1--designated AO-54--easily outlasted initial predictions that it would transmit for about one week. ARISS International Chairman Frank Bauer, KA3HDO, says the mission captured imaginations around the world, despite a much-lower-than-expected signal strength.

"The outreach, press requests and visibility of SuitSat were absolutely amazing and appear to be unprecedented for a ham radio event," Bauer said. "While the press requests are just now starting to wane, we expect that you will continue to see SuitSat status reports and pictures in magazines, Web sites and other literature over the next few months." The more than nine million hits at the SuitSat Web site attest to the level of interest in the SuitSat-1 experiment, Bauer noted, calling the tally "quite impressive indeed!"

Bob King, VE6BLD, in Alberta posted the last confirmed reception of SuitSat-1's voice audio, Saturday, February 18, at 0332 UTC. Richard Crow, N2SPI, in New York received the last confirmed telemetry, which indicated the battery voltage dropping precipitously to a low of 18.3 V before the novel satellite ceased to transmit.

Hearing SuitSat-1's puny signal strength generally required gain antennas, but Bauer says he heard SuitSat with a 3-element Arrow antenna and a handheld radio. Bauer's daughter Michelle recorded the English-language voice identification. Another challenge to signal reception, he said, was the very deep fading due to the suit's rotation in orbit.

"One great positive that came from these issues is that it challenged the ham radio community worldwide to improve their station receive capabilities so that they could pull every bit of signal from SuitSat," Bauer remarked.

Bauer says reports that SuitSat-1 was non-operational and that the battery was frozen shortly after deployment are false. "This never occurred," he stressed. "As the telemetry has shown, temperatures within the suit were a somewhat comfortable 12-16 degrees C during the entire mission."

So, he adds, is the tale of SuitSat-1's early demise and resurrection. "It was alive and operated flawlessly, except the signal strength issue, from the time the crew flipped the switches until the battery power was used up," he said.

Bauer says he's also not ready to buy into an AMSAT calculation that the transmitter may have been putting out between 1 and 10 mW. "It is entirely possible that the radio output could have been at 500 mW, and the feed line, connector or the antenna caused the problem," he said, adding that the SuitSat team has only just begun studying what might have caused the weak signal.

The AMSAT/ARISS team already is looking forward to a SuitSat-2. "Correcting the signal strength issue would be a top priority for this flight," Bauer said. "So would be a longer-term power generation device, like solar arrays."

Although no longer transmitting, SuitSat-1 could continue orbiting Earth for another 70 to 120 days, depending on atmospheric drag, Bauer said.

3Y0X LOGS OVER 87,000 CONTACTS

This month's 3Y0X DXpedition to Peter I Island managed to put 87,034 contacts into its logbook during two weeks of operation before it shut down February 19 at 1813 UTC. The lucky last contact was with K8LTG. The 3Y0X DXpedition surpassed the 82,000 QSOs achieved by A52A (Bhutan), but it fell a bit short of the 96,000 contacts logged by K1B (Baker Island). The 22-member 3Y0X team, headed by led by Ralph Fedor, K0IR, and Bob Allphin, K4UEE, now is safely aboard its ship, the DAP Mares and plans a stop in the South Shetlands on the way home. Because of its remote location in the Bellinghousen Sea near Antarctica and the severe weather conditions, Peter I has been activated but rarely and remains one of the most-wanted DXCC entities. HOUSE OF REPS. SALUTES HAMS

US Rep Mike Ross, WD5DVR (D-AR), this week offered "A Salute to Ham Radio Operators" on the floor of the US House. Ross, one of two Amateur Radio licensees in the House of Representatives (the other is Rep Greg Walden, W7EQI, R-OR), addressed his colleagues February 8 to recognize the contributions of the Amateur Radio community in the wake of last year's devastating hurricane season.

"Citizens throughout America dedicated to this hobby--a hobby that some people consider old fashioned or obsolete--were true heroes in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina as they were often the only line of communication available into the storm ravaged areas," Ross said.

He noted that while ham radio is often overlooked "in favor of flashier means of communication," Gulf Coast communities learned after the 2005 hurricanes that technology can be "highly vulnerable" to storm damage. "Ham radios, entirely self-contained transmitters, require no cell towers or satellites, simply a battery and a strip of wire as an antenna," Ross explained.

Because of the "critical intervention" of radio amateurs across the US, Ross said, many lives were saved following Hurricane Katrina.

"The dedication displayed by ham radio operators in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina sets a tremendous example for us all," Ross concluded, noting that "now more than ever" he's proud to be an Amateur Radio operator. "The people whose lives were rescued as a result of the tireless dedication of ham radio operators will forever be grateful to these selfless public servants."

ARRL EXPO RETURNS TO DAYTON

With thanks to Dayton Hamvention and owing to its popularity among 2005 Hamventioners, ARRL EXPO will return to Dayton this year. Hamvention takes place Friday through Sunday, May 19-21, at Hara Arena near Dayton, Ohio.

"Dayton Hamvention has generously agreed to partner again with ARRL to accommodate ARRL EXPO 2006," ARRL Marketing Manager Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R, announced. "As we did during last year's National Convention, ARRL will organize its primary Hamvention exhibit in the Ballarena, which allows plenty of room to showcase a broad variety of ARRL programs and services. Of course, ARRL EXPO will offer an opportunity for Hamvention visitors to meet ARRL staff members and authors and to learn more about the League's various activities and initiatives--from advocacy and development to technical and regulatory support and operating activities.

Inderbitzen says various ARRL forums will be coordinated with the Dayton Hamvention program. Hamvention sponsor, the Dayton Amateur Radio

HAM RADIO SUDOKU

You've probably seen the highly addictive 9x9 Sudoku puzzles in the newspaper and may have looked at the numbers and thought that they were too mathematical to tackle. Such is not the case. They are based on logic, not math. In the interest of introducing you to the concept, a simple 4x4 puzzle is presented below. Using the call letters of our Vice President, Sterling, N2GT, the object is to fill in each square (cell) with one of the characters of his call such that each is used once and only once in each row, column, and 2x2 block (region bounded by darker lines). To get you started (and make the solution unique), each of the characters has been given in one correct position. Your job is to find the other 3 positions of each character. ARRL FIELD DAY RULES AVAILABLE

The 2006 ARRL Field Day package <<http://www.arrl.org/contests/forms/06-fd-packet.pdf>> and rules (HTML version <<http://www.arrl.org/contests/rules/2006/rules-fd-2006.html>>) (PDF version <<http://www.arrl.org/contests/forms/06-fd-rules.pdf>>) now are available on the ARRL Web site.

"The only rule change in 2006 involves the GOTA ('Get On The Air') station bonus-point structure," says ARRL Contest Branch Manager Dan Henderson, N1ND. "An individual operator may earn a 50-point bonus for completing 50 QSOs at the GOTA station. They may earn an additional 50 bonus points when they reach 100 QSOs."

Henderson notes there's a 100-QSO cap for bonus points per individual GOTA operator, but additional GOTA operators may earn the bonuses for the club, up to a maximum of 500 GOTA bonus points.

"Additionally, Field Day operations can double their GOTA bonus points by having a designated GOTA Coach/Mentor supervise the station whenever it's on the air," Henderson notes. "The GOTA Coach/Mentor may talk the participants through the QSOs and serve as control operator, but GOTA participants must make and log all QSOs themselves."

This means that if a Field Day group has a GOTA Coach/Mentor, the 50 and 100-point bonuses GOTA operators earn will double to 100 and 200 points respectively, while the maximum GOTA bonus increases to 1000 points.

ARRL Field Day 2006 will be Saturday and Sunday, June 24-25.

REVISED TECH QUESTION POOL RELEASED

The Question Pool Committee (QPC) of the National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators (NCVEC) has announced the release of a revised and corrected Element 2 (Technician) question pool. The new Element 2 question pool becomes effective for all Technician-class Amateur Radio examinations administered on or after July 1, 2006. Changes from the initial Element 2 question pool include elimination of some questions (T5D06, T6B09 and T7A08) and rewording of others to increase clarity. "We thank those users who reported the errors and made other suggestions for ways to improve the product," the committee said. "The QPC reviewed all submissions and incorporated the changes that were appropriate." The QPC warned that only the Element 2 question pool dated February 6, 2006, is valid. The new Element 2 database is available for download from the NCVEC Web site as a PDF, MS-Word, Rich Text Format (RTF) or ASCII text file <http://www.ncvec.org/ama_news_article.php?id=82>. The QPC says subsequent changes will be handled by deletion of the affected question. The QPC invites additional input via e-mail <qpcinput@ncvec.org>.

MOST WANTED DX ENTITIES

Scarborough Reef (BS7H) has replaced North Korea (P5) as the most-wanted DXCC entity, according to The DX Magazine's <http://www.dxpub.com/dx_mag.html> 2005 survey of DXers. The Daily DX <<http://www.dailydx.com>> (and QST's "How's DX?") Editor Bernie McClenny, W3UR, says several groups are working toward activating Scarborough Reef. "The problem is not obtaining a license or transportation to the rocks," he reported this week. "There must be serious diplomacy between China and the Philippines in order for this one to be pulled off." The second most-wanted is Lakshadweep (VU7). Swapping spots with Scarborough Reef at number three is North Korea (P5), at four is Peter I (3Y/P), and at five is Yemen (7O). The 3Y0X DXpedition to Peter I <<http://www.peterone.com/>>, expected to begin as early as February 6, could move that entity down the list for this year's survey. McClenny notes that the imminent 3Y0X operation, which received a \$7500 ARRL Colvin grant award, will be the most expensive DXpedition ever. Rounding out the top 10 most-wanted DXCC entities on The DX Magazine's 2005 survey were: Navassa (KP1), Desecheo (KP5), South Sandwich (VP8/S), Glorioso (FR/G) and Andaman and Nicobar Islands (VU4). The Andamans, last activated in late 2004 during the VU4RBI/VU4NRO DXpedition cut short by the South Asia tsunami, are scheduled to be on the air again this April.

AREA AMATEUR EXAM SESSIONS
